

Current Business of the Oxford Commissioners:

The Oxford Stormwater Task Force (as created by the University of Maryland Environmental Finance Center through a DNR technical assistance grant) has completed their Oxford Stormwater and Flood Management Study and presented it to the Town Commissioners and Citizens at two different meetings held in September. Currently the Commissioners are reviewing their recommendations which include Establishing a Stormwater and Tidal Water Utility along with establishing a Utility Rate. The Commissioners are seeking public input regarding this proposal and welcome your comments and questions.

Below are the recommendations presented by the University of Maryland Environmental Finance Center:

 Adopt an Effective Stormwater Program Budget of an estimated \$630,00 over a 5 year period, with an additional major capital improvement project in the next 5-8 years bringing the necessary funding to an estimated\$1,500,000.

 Account for Sea Level Rise by factoring in rise projections into all major capital improvement projects.

 Establish a Stormwater/Tidal-water Utility with a tiered utility fee as a consistent, dedicated and equitable form of revenue to cover program costs, including a recommended base utility fee of \$175/per home/per year.

Legislation during the last quarter included changes to the Historic District Commission chapter of the Oxford Zoning Code and adoption of a revised Flood Plain Management Ordinance,

codes are available on the Town website.

FEMA has just presented the Town with additional map revisions they intend to adopt over the next year. This process will include advertised hearings to be held in Talbot County. Please contact the town office if you have any questions or concerns. As more information becomes available, we will post it online.

We have had concerns expressed by some citizens regarding foxes in town and were asked to share some basic information regarding red foxes. Maryland DNR has detailed information on their website at http://www.dnr.state.md.us/wildlife/Plants_Wildlife/Red_Fox.asp . Below you will find a few facts from this site:




Ideal red fox habitat includes a mix of open fields, small woodlots and wetlands - making modern-day Maryland an excellent place for it to live. Red foxes are also highly adaptive and can be found in suburban and urban areas.

A typical red fox diet includes rabbits, snakes, insects, birds, mice, berries and fruits.

The red fox usually uses a den or burrow only during the period when it is raising pups – a task the male and female fox share together. Red foxes mate from January through March. After a gestation period of 51 to 53 days, females give birth to a litter averaging 4 or 5 pups in the spring. Red foxes may dig their own burrows, but they usually improve an abandoned groundhog burrow. It also is common for foxes to den in the crawl space under decks and sheds. During the remainder of the year, the red fox avoids dens and sleeps in sheltered locations by relying on its thick fur for warmth.

While its cousins the wolf and dog are social, the red fox tends to be more solitary except during the breeding season. The red fox is capable of learning from experience, which has earned it the "cunning" namesake in literature. This clever nature, its adaptability and careful management, ensure that the red fox will roam the Chesapeake Bay watershed for many generations to come.

Music, hilarity, and romantic misconceptions are featured in the Tred Avon Players production of *She Loves Me* directed by Edwin Talley Wilford. This musical romantic comedy opens October 17 with book by Joe Masteroff, lyrics by Sheldon Harnick, and music by Jerry Bock.

Mr. Maraczek, (Tyron Roy) the owner of a shop in Budapest arrives to open the store; and the music, romance, and

She Loves Me is produced by Leigh Marquess with musical direction by Randy Bachand and Ellen Berry Grunden as rehearsal pianist. Stage manager is Rachel Shaw, costumes by Marie U'Ren, and choreography by Malley Hester.

Wilford mentions: "I pick stories to tell based on how the narrative will connect with its audience. While I did not select *She Loves Me* to direct, being asked to direct it in place of a friend interested me. An initial glance at the story reveals a humorous tale between two mismatched co-workers, a funny, but otherwise typical love story. After re-reading the script, I wondered, What if our romantic leads were older? Upcoming lectures are on Saturdays at 11 am at St. Paul's Church as follows. Lectures are free; donations always welcome

October 5 - Ed Thieler, local model builder and sometime historian, will present "100 Years Ago - Working the Water in Oxford."


